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Part A:**Unit 3A—Societies and change**

You are required to answer **one (1)** of the following questions from your chosen time period of study. Use the pages provided from page 16 and clearly indicate the number of the question that you are answering.

**Egypt: Dynasty 19: The Beginnings of the End—Ramses I, Seti I and Ramses II
(c. 1295 BCE–1213 BCE).**

Question 3 **(25 marks)**

Examine the impact of the change of dynasty on individuals and groups during the period of study.

or

Question 4 **(25 marks)**

Examine a major military activity of Ramses II and discuss its impact on the Egyptian state.

or

Question 5 **(25 marks)**

To what extent was the Egyptian state economically, politically and militarily stronger at the end of the period of study than at the beginning?

Greece: Athenian democracy and Empire from the creation of the Delian League to the revolt of Samos in 440/39 BCE.

Question 6 (25 marks)

Examine how Athens was able to bring about the change of the Delian League into an Athenian Empire. Assess the extent to which this change created cohesion and/or division among Athens' allies.

or

Question 7 (25 marks)

Explain the rise of Athenian democracy in the period of study. Evaluate the roles played by Pericles and at least **one** other individual in this development.

or

Question 8 (25 marks)

Assess the impact of the Empire on the political, military and cultural life of Athens in the period 478–440 BCE.

Rome: Augustus from the first settlement of Augustus in 27 BCE to his death in 14 CE.

Question 9 (25 marks)

To what extent was Rome militarily and politically stronger and/or more stable in 14 CE than in 27 BCE?

or

Question 10 (25 marks)

Analyse the importance of religion and religious displays in Augustus's consolidation of his position.

or

Question 11 (25 marks)

Assess the impact of the Augustan reforms on the social and cultural life of Rome.

Part B:**Unit 3B—People, ideas and events that shaped history.**

Students are required to answer **one** of the following questions. Students must answer their chosen question with reference to one of the following contexts only:

Egypt: The Amarna 'Revolution' from the accession of Amenhotep III (c. 1390 BCE) to the death of Horemheb (c. 1295 BCE).

or

Greece: The Peloponnesian War from 440/39 BCE to the surrender of Athens in 404/3 BCE.

or

Rome: The Julio-Claudians from the death of Augustus in 14 CE to the death of Nero in 68 CE.

Question 12**(25 marks)**

Assess the impact of **one** event in the period that you have studied.

or

Question 13**(25 marks)**

Examine the ways in which those in power and authority persuaded society to accept as legitimate the values and beliefs of the powerful.

or

Question 14**(25 marks)**

Discuss the changing circumstances of specific individuals or groups in your period of study.
