Question 1

1

Almost all visual texts reflect or challenge society's values. For example films such as She's the man criticise the lack of gender equality in today's society and challenges women to stand up for themselves and make a difference. Night a novel written by Elie Wiesel challenges society about discrimination and war. The images from set one reflect society's values of sex and beauty. A television series called Law and Order: SVU reflects society's values of making sure everyone is safe and it also reflects some negative values of violence in society. All visual texts may reflect or challenge society's values.

The images in set one of the film posters for Casino Royale and Lara Croft Tomb raider both reflect society's values of sex and beauty. The woman on the Tomb raider poster is in a skin tight outfit showing off her figure she is beautiful and she is made to look sexy. On the poster for Casino Royale the male is made to look handsome and there is a women in the background with a sexy dress on. Advertisers have used this form of advertising because they know that sex sells because beauty and sex appeal are valued. I also think that the images challenge society because violence is obviously a main aspect of the film as both actors are holding guns. Although people find this entertaining, they are challenged to know when violence is taken too far. I think these images in set one both challenge and reflect society's values.

In the film She's the man gender equality in today's

society is challenged. In the film a teenaged girl pretends to be a boy so she is able to play soccer. The film challenges society, it asks the question, why should a girl be ~~critised~~ for playing soccer and a boy encouraged? She's the man definitely challenges societal values.

Night ~~overcomes~~ challenges society by telling the story of a young boy and his journey through the holocaust. ~~overcomes~~ It challenges the reader because it questions society. Most people believed what happened in the holocaust was disgusting and we question why the world didn't stop it. But then we are challenged because is the holocaust not the same as the massacre that occurred in Rwanda or the wars happening over east? and what is society doing about this? What are we doing to stop it? The writer of Night challenges society's values successfully by stating that the holocaust is repeating itself and society is turning its back.

There is a T.V. series called law and order: SVU which is about a crime squad who work to stop sexual abuse. I believe this show reflects societal values to make sure everyone is safe and people aren't being abused. However it also reflects societal values in a negative way. It reflects the minority of today's society who value abusing other people, those who value violence. I think it's good that this series not only reflects the positive values of today's society but also a few negative ones. I believe

I am Sam employs symbolic elements such as colour throughout to evoke the relevant emotion in the audience. It is a text seeking to allow the text strings. Sam, the ~~great~~ protagonist blunders has seen to a boy while is cloaked in... ~~clothes of~~ indandescent colours, and his brief liaison with his estranged daughter, therefore buried in rich, warm glow, almost heavenly in nature. We feel that this association is right, it is just, which makes child scenes even more villainous, lecherous,邪恶 much. The epitome of all things evil. Our values do, finally, me... ^{Reflected} endorsed of love of familial bonds. // In complete comparison, the subjects of Mandeball wheelchair-bound, hide-looking males are given aggressive colours, constantly. They challenge the dominant attitudes of society. They are not to be pitied, as is common. They are to be feared, to be treated as an equal. Dysphalism has partitioned the

viewer to reflect the dominant attitudes in Sean's construction to challenge in Murderball?

The position of the subject in ~~set~~ ^{focus} ~~Set~~ 1 is very telling of the attitudes and values the images embody. The first image, of the latest 007 flick, perhaps the chivalrous Mr Bond advancing toward the viewer, clarifying one sort of noble quest to rescue the shrinking female. His face is bathed in light; he has a destiny to fulfil. He is glorified. A woman stands in the background, looking upon him largely. She is marginalised to the point of ~~the~~ ^{explain} hyperbole, shadowed within the shadow of him; a very traditional representation. It is an image that endorses our values and attitudes, attitudes alarmingly, a text that encapsulates the sexism of Western society so much that it is unquestioned, accepted.

In complete stark contrast, the second image, ^A flies in the face of the attitudes reflecting shifting values etc. woman is standing in the centre of the image, glorified, with the camera looking up on her in an almost God-like fashion. She is empowered, powerful, dominant. And she is a woman. Challenging. She is not the submissive housewife we see so often in texts, but over ~~the~~ a buzz to be reckoned with, an ~~an~~ individual that is not going to take more from anyone. Her representation and that of the woman in image 1 could not be more different. The second image is challenging to the extreme, ~~the~~ image one reflects to the extreme. It is this construction that alters the communication.

Sean is similar to both images. It endorses preconceived notions of social groups. Murderball can be seen as similar to image 2. The role of the said group is

* moved to the extreme, and inversely forced to challenge their values accordingly.

Whilst the two images provided are static, one can assume they would offer similar audio codes to that of their counterpart. * I am Darn exhausts cutaway, little-gurl talk to emphasise the innocence of Darn's daughter, ~~and 21 days~~. The text also bestows upon them the observation of an adult; observers seemingly too simple for the confused adult mind, but which provide solutions stuck in the simplicity. We, at least, think "Aw, isn't Lucy cute?" No challenging there. We then turn safely past Darn down as a genuine man, without the corruption of modernity, fully capable of love, or just about the intelligence. No challenges there, either.

One can assume Lava Craft in Image 2 would be much the same aggressive nature as the subjects of Murderball, contrasting the former challenging it to ~~heat~~ ~~burning~~ ~~not~~ sympathy, but with ~~intimidate~~ an emotion specific to them as individuals, not as "nipples & wheelchairs", as they so eloquently put it. No euphemisms, no carefully worded half-truths, the speech in Murderball is direct, to the point. It is consistent with the characters; it is challenging to the dominant mindset ~~free~~

though the use of technical, written ~~and~~ audio and symbolic codes it is easy to see how coupled with techniques of construction and a characterisation, it is easy to see texts can be blend or subvert ideological constructs. They can challenge, reflect, endorse, condemn. The impact that Diva Lava is left up to us.

→ It is important to note the significant impact context has on the way in which texts are received. We know from the syllabus it is not the texts themselves, but the meaning our context dictates us to draw from the texts that in⁷pact our ~~mean~~^{mean} perception ~~as~~ so completely. It stands to reason that texts glorifying values we do not endorse will not go to our top-10 lists. ~~Marketing~~ There are values dominant in ~~our~~ our society, and these values are championed or rejected depending on the intent of the text.

Q1. For many years, visual texts have either challenged or reflected society's values. They images chosen in Set One are an extremely good example of this.

As women over time, the role of a woman in society has changed greatly. In set one, there is a role significant role reversal between the two images. In Image one, which is the feature poster of the James Bond film Casino Royale, the man is in the power, as the dominant figure over the woman standing in the shadows. He looks as though he is leaving her and he has a determined, fiery look in his eyes. His bowtie is undone, and it appears it his appearance resembles someone who has finished work for the day, looking untidy and although he is clean cut and well dressed, this differs from Image two as the woman (Angelina Jolie) who plays Lara Croft in the feature film The Cradle of Life is in the power role and is covered from head to toe in ammunition, guns and knives, thus challenging society's values as the woman is fighting, which is traditionally a man's role, as reflected in Image one.

challenge

The camera angles used reinforce the current assumptions about gender roles in society. This is seen in Image 2 as the character is centred and it appears like she is above the camera, or it is turned up to face her giving the impression that she is powerful, dominant and to be feared by all, unlike the other image in Set One which is taken at eye-level? as to seem like we are at level with the ~~dominant~~ male character, ruining the dominant vibe that would reflect the values of society and taking away the power of the character.

Gender roles are a major factor in challenging people's

always

values. As ~~nowadays~~ men are no longer seen as the 'breadwinner' women have been given more power. In ~~the past~~ it would have been difficult to find a company or situation where women were in charge. However, nowadays women are slowly changing rather than challenging society's values by no longer staying at home to cook clean and provide ~~for~~ ^{women} for their families. An example of this is the film "Mona Lisa Smile". This film is set in ~~the past~~ where women were able to ~~go~~ attend school but were expected to marry immediately after graduation. Their new art teacher interviews her students asking them what they plan to do after school. One replies "After school, will get married and have children" The teacher replies "What else?" and the student looks ~~at~~ confused as she says "Get married," again. ~~Again~~ This ~~is~~ ^{to} convey how much society's values have changed, displaying women how they used to view themselves, rather than what they have become.

The title of Image two reflects rather than challenges the values. The Cradle of Life makes reference to how ~~women~~ women are expected to care for babies and ~~comfort~~ ^{but} them rather than going having a job killing people. This title is behind the character and the word 'cradle' is covered giving the impression that it doesn't exist in her world of guns, ~~knives~~ ^{after} knives and weapons. Image one does not carry the same symbolism. Casino Royale is in small ~~few~~ capital letters at the bottom of the image, as well as being illuminated on the backdrop. The 007, which is associated with the name James Bond is highlighted at the bottom title and the 7 placed underneath with a gun coming out the side simulating the effect of a hand holding a gun. This further ~~by~~ reflects society's values of males being the only ones to fire guns.

Another example of a supporting text is the film Desperate Housewives. A main character, Bree Hodge played by Marcia Cross, reflects the old values held by society. Her ^{character} ~~Bree~~ stays at home and looks, cleans and gardens while her husband goes out and makes a living for the family. She resembles a stepparent wife that makes everything perfect within her household by keeping their life in an immaculate state, unlike her friends who work and fight with their husband, boyfriend, children etc.

Visual texts are very effective in reflecting and challenging society's values. They serve to influence the viewer encouraging them to adopt the values presented in the text. This is evident in the set of images displayed, as well as Mona Lisa Smile and Desperate Housewives.

Question 2

Visual texts can often be more confronting than written texts. Visual texts can shape the way that we see ourselves, our society or even the world. The most hard hitting facts aren't driven into our thoughts through words and statistics but visual images. More of a connection is made with a visual ~~text~~ image than a written paragraph.

A very important topic being addressed all over the world is the issue of climate change, carbon emissions, greenhouse gasses, pollution. It's all over the news, newspapers, movies and magazines. Everyone is cashing in on the crisis and trying to help out the world. The world is aware of what's happening in the world and each individual is searching for a way to help their own society and ultimately the world.

First, the visual text is set two really hits the ball on the head. The heading 'Be worried, Be very worried' is big, bold and stands out against the dark background. This catches the eye and really targets the audience thinking we then want to know what it is that we should

We worried about the picture of the polar bear gives us some indication as to what that is. The use of lighting focusses our eye onto the lone polar bear, vaguely we can see that there isn't really any ice for it to stand on. Due to the heading and the lack of ice we interpret this as being something to do with global warming. This also plays on our emotional appeal through the lone polar bear we react to this and are urged on impulse to find out what we can do in our world to help the poor animal.

The second visual text also works to reinforce the message about global warming. Through the selection of images included in this text we are positioned to consider the effect that this issue is having on our world. Immediately we stop and linger at this poster. The penguins are walking along and at first nothing out of the ordinary seems to jump at us. However the penguins are walking on what appears to be a sandy desert for miles around. This is characterised by the nipples and the low hills of sand in the background. This re-iterates what the title sat caption under the title says, 'We're all on thin ice'. We assume that because the penguins are now walking on desert sand their ice is no longer there.

Once again it plays on our emotional appeal. Animals are being hurt by this and that is often what spans the world into action. When our actions start to impact on nature and the fauna that live in that habitat the world sits up, listens and starts to take notice.

These construction elements of visual texts combine with our context to make us think about the world and the effect that our actions have upon it. These constructional elements in visual texts serve only to play on emotional appeal or to appeal to our values and attitudes. This makes us think about the images and the messages that these images are trying to portray. How we receive these messages and what action we take, if any is influenced largely by our context what kind of person we are, what type of society we live in and whether or not we accept the ideas and messages of the visual text.

Through the combination of constructional techniques used in visual texts, ~~and~~ the emotional appeal they may or may not have and contextual background, they serve the purpose of making us think about world issues and events.

Visual texts serve for many specific purposes, which relate to society and the world as a whole. They present many themes and ideas across for the viewer to adopt, which are relevant to the world in which we live. Through the use of visual conventions, these themes and ideas aid in the sole purpose's of the text. Such visual texts that present important and relevant purposes in our lives ~~are~~ include Murder Ball, directed by Dana Adam Shapiro, Ten Canoes, directed by Rolf de Heer, and Set two of the given visuals which include a Time Magazine front cover, and the film poster of An Inconvenient Truth.

MurderBall is a film, based on physically challenged men who go against society's dominant attitudes towards them, and achieve their goals while living their lives to the fullest. The main purpose of the film is to ~~make the audience~~ challenge the dominant attitudes towards physically challenged people in society, and to cause ~~the~~ audience to respect and admire the characters as well as these this group as a whole in society! Most people consider these people as inferior to others, retard, and weird people. Within throughout the film, the characters are continuously being interviewed about their personal lives. This helps the audience to change their attitudes and think about how these people are treated in our society. It makes us think how much it would 'suck' to be like them, and how if we were living like them in wheelchairs, we wouldn't like everyone to think of us like the way we consider them today. This is achieved partly due to close-ups of the character faces, giving across much deeper emotional response.

Another feature film ~~is~~ which causes the audience to consider their own how aborigines are treated and thought about in their own society and country, is Ten Canoes. This film's main purpose is to make society aware that aborigines way of life is very similar to our own, however is also very different, and they shouldn't be judged based on their culture. It is a story told by an elder to a young man, to teach him valuable life skills and lessons. The audience is positioned to gain some acceptance of the aboriginal culture, and a little small understanding as to what their culture means to them as individuals. This issue regarding aborigines is very relevant to our society today, as most people relate aborigines to drug and alcohol abusers, violent people who are inferior to us white Australians. By making the audience aware that the aboriginal culture is just as important to them as our culture is to us, society's negative attitudes towards them are challenged, and people start to consider that it was actually our fault for ~~these~~ aborigines today not having any belonging to any culture at all.

Within set two, the two visual images given cause the ~~the~~ viewer to think about the society and world in which we live. Both are relating to climate change, and making society more aware of the effects this world-wide problem will have on our lives and all the animals lives ~~on~~ our ~~the~~ planet. The first image is from the front cover of a Time magazine, found from the website www.time.com.


This image is conveying that the polar regions on our planet are melting, which are causing the polar bears to die ^{and} sea levels to rise. The body gesture the polar bear is in, with his stiff neck and body trying very hard to balance itself, ~~is~~ symbolises humans and what we will be like if we don't change our ways to stop climate change. The subtitles are in big, capitalised letters, drawing in the viewer's attention. They say "Be worried. Be very worried." The repetition of the same phrase emphasises the fact that climate change is going to have many horrible effects. The word 'very' added to the second phrase adds even more emphasis on how severe the consequences will be. The first image is causing the viewer to think about what they as individuals and ~~in~~ society as a whole, to stop climate change.

The second image is conveying similar themes. It was found from www.allposters.com, and is a film poster for the film An Inconvenient Truth. The visual image displays penguins walking across ice, in which they do most days. People generally sympathise towards penguins, so by using them in the poster, the audience is automatically drawn in to see what the purpose of the image is. The subtitle "We're all on thin ice" is taking the place of the word 'inconvenient' from the title. This is relating to the effects of climate change. It is saying it is everyone's problem in the world, and everyone is going to suffer if we don't take up measures to prevent it from occurring. This text is making the viewer consider changing their ways in order to prevent climate change from occurring.

All types of visual texts have purposes which they want to make society to consider. These purposes are conveyed to the reader through particular themes and ideas, as well as through elements of construction. The aim of visual texts is to make people think about and consider their society and world in which they live.

Q2 Consider the ways in which visual texts may serve the purpose of making you think about yourself, your own society or about the world.

Visual texts serve a purpose of making you think about yourself, your society or about the world. They can accomplish this in many ways, but mainly achieve this by engaging you in the story through the construction of the text which puts you into the character's shoes.

In the film Mona Lisa Smile, one of the main characters - Joan, believes that she wants to get married and become a housewife. She decides this after much consideration of going onto university and in the end she chooses a family. Through the ~~dialogue~~ of her dialogue and actions it was obvious that she felt so needed to make a choice. For example, she stated "I want a home, I want a family and that's not something I'm willing to sacrifice". This was obvious. This text made me think about myself and my own society where I am able to choose both compared to the DS where they are expected to become a housewife.

The engaging of texts is again present in the visual text Lara Croft. Where I am put into Lara's shoes. This feeling of placement as the character is obvious as I feel nervous or scared and have feelings of great suspense when something is about to occur and this is a result of the construction of the texts.

In both of the posters for the visual texts it is obvious ~~that~~ the ~~main~~ character who the main characters are as they are focused on in the foreground. Both the characters are looking off at something in the distance and you can tell that they are both action heroes as they are holding guns.

By having one male and one female it displays the gender equality of todays society and that females and males can play the same roles.

Also, by displaying the guns it is showing the increased occurrence of violence in films and I also think that that is a display of todays society which ~~is~~ appears to be a lot more dangerous and violent than even thirty years ago, which is saying something about the world in which we live in today.

The angle on the poster of Lara Croft is also looking up at her making her the dominant figure and she is also based in the centre of the screen. This all reinforces that she is the main character and the film will be based on her.

In Casino Royale, the main focus is on James Bond, the main character which ~~who~~ makes him dominant, but having the woman in the background also means that she will be present in the film and will also have a main role.

These are examples of how in society individuals are more dominant now and are a lot more powerful and again reinforces the gender equality.

Overall as you can see, visual texts ~~never~~ serve a purpose of making you think about yourself - being put into their circumstance makes you think about society and also about the world.

Visual texts are the most commonly viewed text type in society. (Their viewing does not even have to be as obvious as to watch a movie.) A simple glance at a poster is enough to achieve a representation of a particular group or individual in society. Often we are oblivious to the way in which we are purposely manipulated to see a text in a certain way. Conventions of visual texts accentuate the representation and thus convey particular values and attitudes to the audience.

The common representation of women has changed dramatically over time. In society they were seen as housewives, only useful to fulfill the needs of their husband and children. For a long time women have been seen as mere possessions of their partners. This representation is completely inappropriate and goes against

all that was achieved through the feminist movement of the 1960's. Another typical representation of women in society is that of newly formed individual. Someone who is equal to men and can hold her own, no longer the damsel in distress. The two images in set one of the provided images and the feature film Mona Lisa Smile convey the portrayal of these three ~~three~~ differing representations of women in society.

Mrs. Mona Lisa Smile set in 1953 America, embedded in a society where the values of family and marriage. An emphasis was placed on women to keep the perfect home and to be the perfect mother and wife. In a scene where a main character Betty is getting family portraits for her newspaper, the portrayal and importance of a perfect family is emphasised. Standing in conservative, pastel ^{coloured} clothing, with an open book in one hand, whilst leaning over the stove with a spoon stirring a pot in the other hand, Betty is positioned ~~so~~ that she is standing in front of her husband. Whilst he stands, hand in pocket and cigar in mouth. They pose and the screen flashes black and white and the frame is still, as if looking at a picture. Conventions have been used to establish the representation of women being inferior to men. It is seen to be an accurate portrayal as the black and white is symbolic of truth. Furthermore holding the book and cooking, shows the high expectations placed upon women of the time to multi-task, have a job and an education whilst also raising a family. Such conventions of visual texts were used to convey the ^{primary} representation of women in society as inferior to men.

.....image one, conveys the second representation of women in society. The portrayal of women as not people, but items and possessions. In this poster for the film Casino Royale, the strong and heroic man stands front on in a powerful stance. He is calm and collected and he has no fear of the impending doom that awaits. He holds a powerful and masculine grip on the long gun at his side. His facial expression is that of determination, a steely look. The camera angle is low, so that it is looking up at him, making him seem larger and accentuating his power. This representation of the heroic male is juxtaposed with the image of the woman in the background. This same camera angle makes her look smaller and therefore inferior to the male. He needs to protect her. She wears clothing that accentuates her womanly features - she is beautiful and elegant, a prized possession. As opposed to the facial expression of the male, her facial expression is conninged and flinching. Furthermore her body stance is sideways, facing away from danger. The conventions of this visual text have conveyed the representation of women in society, being in possession of males or strong male.

The final representation of women in society is of a powerful, feminist. However, ^{women are} not seen as powerful in same light as men. Instead women are strong and sexy! This representation is conveyed in the second image of set 1. This image has the same purpose as image one, however represents

women in a completely different light. Embossed large lettering completes the background for "Lara Croft". The low camera angle makes her tall and ~~assuring~~. The sun in the background is smaller than she is, she is strong, bigger and more powerful than that which gives the entire earth light. Where she steps there is wake. At her ankles the water around her splashes as if the her sheer strength moves everything. ^{is of determination and she} like the story of Moses. Her stance holds her gun at her side. A gun bigger than that of the previous image. Her outfit embodies the sexiness of this representation of women. Skin tight suit that leaves nothing to the imagination and light that falls over her breasts and thighs. Women can not be seen as powerful and strong as men are. Seen only as strong in the light of sexiness. This is evident also in how her hand rests upon her hip. Her facial expression with her chin up, is stern and cold. As opposed to the previous image where the woman's hair was out and soft, wavy, the hair of the women in the second image is contained, plaited and matileous placed in a particular position. Women who are seen to be strong and powerful ~~are~~ not only seen to be sexy but are heatless and cold. This is because it is a representation that goes against the maternal nature and representation of women as portrayed in such films as Mona Lisa Smile.

Conventions such as framing, lighting, costume, facial expression and background work to convey a particular representation of groups in society. The two images

of set one and the portray of women in Mona Lisa.
smile highlight the three common representations of women in society. Primarily women can be seen as maternal and only living to fulfil the desires of their family - promoting such values as family and marriage. Secondly they are represented as possessions of males - the values of beauty and elegance. The final representation of women in society as conveyed by the second image is that of strength and power, influenced by sexiness and cold hearted nature. The development of representations of women has occurred over a long period. It will be interesting to see how society progresses, and what the next representation of women will be. All of these representations and portrayals of women have been formed through the use of visual conventions.

Visual texts play a significant role in conveying particular representations of groups or individuals in society. The representations can be achieved through conventions of texts, they work to foreground a particular viewpoint on groups or individuals in society. ~~QUESTION~~
 Example: The representation of male and female gender roles is one that is predominantly displayed in society and is a representation that is ever changing, mostly due to the culture and circumstances of a society at a particular point in time.

The two visual texts in set one represent male and female identity. The male from the movie poster 'Casino Royale' is constructed to be confident, independent and in control. His laid back, sophisticated yet somewhat arrogant stance works to define the male identity as dominant and powerful. The use of a short depth of field camera shot focusing on the man (James Bond) with the lady blurred in the background suggests a difference in status between men and women. It reinforces the society's dominant view of men as the dominant power figures and females as less empowered. Finally, she looks insignificant and inferior compared to him, creating the view that women are of less importance to men. Finally, by placing the male in a suit and the fact that he is holding a gun further defines his masculinity and powerful position. The conventions of this visual text are detrimental to the representation of women. The movie poster conveys showing males to be the empowered, controlling figure of the two genders.

The second image of the set shows contrasting representations and challenges the dominant attitude of society towards women that they are the weaker of the genders and have little independence or power. The low camera angle looking

up at the woman (Lara Croft) creates a dominating, empowered persona. This use of camera angle makes her look intimidating and forceful. Her stance and facial expression is proud and independent suggesting that she is in a leadership position or is of great importance. She is wearing adventurous clothing and is placed in an open nature setting, a place where you would not expect many women to be. This constructs women to be adventurous, outgoing risk takers. The other poster showed the woman in a dress, thus conveying women to be more concerned with their appearance and as valuing money and material things over their independence or a leadership role.

Hence there were two representations derived from these images. The conventions of other visual texts can successfully work to convey the representations of male and female/gender roles. A clear representation of the position of male and females is derived from the film The Full Monty. Set in North England, this film addresses the story of six working class men who are thrown into unemployment and who turn to stripping to gain recognition and earn some money. This film pushes the fragility of the male identity to its limits. The men, through the conventions of colour,

Symboism and colour (of clothing and setting) are conveyed as vulnerable, suffocated and placed in a disempowered position to the women of society. For example one of the men Gaz witnesses a woman urinating in the style of a male in the ~~women's~~ toilets and he says to the other men at the job centre 'That's it... When women start pissing like us, we've had it! They'll be the end of us... we won't be needed anymore - obsolete, dinosaurs, yesterday's news. Men will become extinct'. This creates the representation that men are losing their dominant position and no longer have full control anymore, women are starting to gain independence, placing the position of males under threat.

There are, of course, contrasting representations of male and female gender roles evoked from various texts. This is due to the cultural and other circumstances present at that time. 'Women of the Holy Kingdom' is about the role of women in Saudi Arabia. This society is still predominantly controlled by men as it states that only 6% of women make up the workforce. In this documentary the women are always shown in the traditional abayas and are together in groups of women. This creates the representation that Arabic women are interdependent on one another and

have very little power. However, there was an image of an Arabic woman from a book about Dubai that conveyed a different representation. The woman was placed in an office building overlooking the city, holding a file. This conveyed the representation that she was successful, independent and empowered.

Conventions of visual texts can convey very different representations of groups or individuals in society. With reference to the representation of gender roles and positions, here are a number of representations that were derived. It can be said that men and women are undergoing 'gender merging' and the males no longer are the sole holders of leadership, independent positions. The conventions of the various visual texts e.g. camera angles, position and expression of characters, symbolism, dialogue work to convey the particular viewpoints.
