2. Explore the ways that values and attitudes are revealed through characterisation in the text.
3. Discuss the effectiveness of the construction of voice in a text you have studied to convey the attitudes and values of the text.
4. Discuss how the text takes the readers on a journey to understand human experience.

The 2002 novel, Jasper Jones, written by Craig Silvey explores a plethora of issues regarding human behaviour. The Charlie Bucktin, the narrator and the protagonist of the text invites the audience into the fictitious WA town - Colligee where racism, status and prejudiced machismo seems to be the 'norm'.

The text reveals the ~~sad~~ idea that humans will ^{personal flaws} blame others for their own actions than stand up for what is in society, there is always a scapegoat ^{guilt and} which ^{is} then people transfer their collective ^{guilt and} culpability onto. In the text, Jasper is the scapegoat. Jasper, through the gossip of the town is stereotyped as the typical 'bad boy' "he is a thief, a liar, a ^{was} thug, a ^{would} truant". Jasper is the perfect figure individual to blame for any wrongdoing as he already has a bad reputation. The towns people despite their own personal flaws will blame another person than admit it to their wrongdoings. Charlie states "for some people, it is easier to blame another than to have the strength to make it right". Charlie recognises the weakness of the towns people as they do not have the 'strength' to acknowledge their actions. Instead the towns people feel comfortable with blaming ^{Jasper} another and watching him get punished for it. They lack courage and justice like people in today's society, which influences them to behave negatively ^{by being a) others acknowledged their}. The text conveys that humans ^{would never acknowledge their} ^{wanted rather blame own personal} ^{others than stand up.}

The text has been deliberately structured in a way to show in ^{highlight} express the repeating idea that humans want to escape their problems. Escapism is usually a way for individuals to ^{and} avoid their problems.

Charlie, the protagonist of the text repeatedly suggests that he wants to escape to the city to get away from Corrigan and Laura's murderer. For instance, Charlie states "Like the first night this whole mess took me over... I need to sleep it away... I need to wake up somebody new... I need to leave with Jasper". Charlie who is so terrified of being caught for participating in Laura's disappearance wants to escape Corrigan so that no one can link him to her murder. Charlie lacks courage and wants to leave his responsibility behind by moving to the city. Similarly, Ruth (Charlie's mother) wants to escape Corrigan and her marriage. Her Ruth's attempt to leave Corrigan escape her marriage caused her to have affairs; "you don't understand... Your father doesn't love me. He never has". Instead of Ruth trying to solve disputes between herself and her husband she ran away to get herself of her relationship problems. She did this by committing adultery. As Ruth was caught, it gave her the opportunity to leave Corrigan and be "cosseted by her family". If Ruth took her ^{negative} actions and chose to leave behind her wrong life and issues, escape Corrigan. The text shows how humans are weak in the idea that they will ^{try} leave their responsibility behind if there is any possible way to escape.

The text highlights the terrifying and alarming idea that often the darkness of a person is often hidden under the surface. For instance, Pete Wishart is an incestuous rapist who is also a well highly regarded person in the community of Corrigan and the Shire president. The idea that a man with such power and popularity is so evil is scary. Pete Wishart would drunkenly abuse Laura, both sexually and physically and led to Laura becoming pregnant; "full of yucky milky poison".

Pete's actions were continuous and Charlie found it hard to accept how he was perceived so well by Pete. Charlie struggles to accept Charlie states, her father... the shire president would visit Laura's room at night. But he did not speak politely. He slept in drunk. Always drunk. Always discreet? Charlie uses both the titles, "father" and "shire president" to convey that the actions of an individual are often hidden by their role.
