#### Instructions to candidates



Section One: There are **six (6)** questions in this section. You are required to answer **three (3)** questions.

The questions in this section focus on the previewed stimulus material provided to candidates via schools prior to the examination. Excerpts and stills from the stimulus material for this section are provided in the Source Booklet.

Section Two: There are **five (5)** questions in this section. You are required to answer **two (2)** questions.

- 4. You must be careful to confine your responses to the specific questions asked and to follow any instructions that are specific to a particular question.
- 5. Spare pages are included at the end of this booklet. They can be used for planning your responses and/or as additional space if required to continue an answer.
  - Planning: If you use the spare pages for planning, indicate this clearly at the top

  - Continuing an answer: If you need to use the space to continue an answer, indicate

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Section One: Short answer 15% (30 Marks)

There are **six** (6) questions in this section. You are required to answer **three** (3) questions.

This section requires you to use short answer forms to answer the questions. Short answers could include headings and subheadings; highlighting of relevant key points; lists and dot points; diagrams and sketches to help you to communicate your ideas in a concise manner.

Your response to each question must be made in relation to at least **one (1)** of the stimulus materials provided to candidates via schools prior to the examination. The stimulus materials are:

1. Kony 2012 online media photography 2. Salgado photographs 3. The Black Balloon Mars Attacks! 4. audiovisual 5. The Lost Thina 6. The Cove The Lord of the Rings: The Fellowship of the Ring 7.

Excerpts and stills from the stimulus materials are provided in the Source Booklet.

In your answers, you may use the same stimulus more than once.

Suggested working time: 45 minutes.

Question 1 (10 marks)

Explain the impact of personal expression. You must address:

- distinctive stylistic elements
- selection processes.

Question 2 (10 marks)

Discuss how values are represented. You must address:

- the use of stereotypes
- possible resistant or alternative readings.

Question 3 (10 marks)

Explain how audience interest is maintained. You must address:

- how the plot is manipulated to maintain audience interest
- other elements that maintain interest.

Question 4 (10 marks)

Discuss how setting is used to establish the narrative. You must address:

- choice of time and place
- how key themes are constructed.

Question 5 (10 marks)

Discuss the use of lighting and colour. You must address:

- how lighting and colour are used symbolically
- how mood is created.

Question 6 (10 marks)

Discuss the representation of contemporary issues. You must address:

- the representation of specific issues
- how the audience is positioned to respond.

Section Two: Extended answer 35% (70 Marks)

There are five (5) questions in this section. You are required to answer two (2) questions.

This section requires you to use extended answer forms to answer the questions. Extended answers include but are not limited to conventional essay format. Diagrams, sketches and lists may be included if they are appropriate to your answer.

Justify your choices with evidence from any media work you have studied and other relevant information, referring to specific examples and using media terminology.

Suggested working time: 105 minutes.

Question 7 (35 marks)

How do cultural contexts and audiences work together to make meaning?

Question 8 (35 marks)

Discuss the impact of current media trends on society and the controls and constraints placed on the producers of your chosen media work.

Question 9 (35 marks)


Explain how the representation of an issue can reinforce or challenge audience perceptions.

Question 10 (35 marks)

What is media art and how are contemporary audiences able to interpret it?

Question 11 (35 marks)

Discuss how selection processes can affect the representation of values in media work.



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
