Discuss how art film are constructed to appeal to a niche audience.

Art Film: A term to describe foreign and independent films that do not follow the standard Hollywood emphasis on big budgets, Major stars and realist narratives. The art film is often experimental, smaller in scope and less widely distributed. Art films often are regarded as less commercial and more sophisticated than mainstream films, but this is not always the case.

A Single Man:

- Theme- 1960's & homophobia
- Appeals to:
 - the LGBTQ community
 - people who enjoy watching famous actors such as Collin Firth, Nicholas Hoult and Ginnifer Goodwin

Art films are films that differ from the standard Hollywood emphasis on big budgets, major stars and realist narratives. Unlike Hollywood films, art films have a smaller target audience as they are not created for commercial use and therefore target a niche audience. A Single Man appears to be an art film as it presents visual techniques that differ from the standard Hollywood film. We see that Mr George has just been told that his male partner has passed away and he is struggling to cope without any support. It presents the ideas of homosexuals and the nuclear family, shown in the 1960's where the 'norm' of a family was for the mother to stay home, look after the children while attending to the fathers needs as he works during the day. A Single Man aired on SBS 1 in February 2016 appealing to an older audience being on that specific channel.

A Single Man appears to have a higher budget than most art films as many major actors, as the main character is Collin Firth and many other major actors make an appearance in the film too. This makes room for a larger audience but the target audience is people of the LGBTQ community, people suffering of mental illnesses such as depression, and film goers. Mr George appears to have trouble coping to the news about his partner passing away and his partners family is blocking him out. During the phone call, he stays put together but can't take it once it ends, sadness consumes him as he runs in the rain to his friend's house. The only audio heard is the loud patter of rain even when he is screaming and crying to his neighbour. The rain represents the emotion consuming him as it's so loud, it shows there is nothing else he can think about bad this sadness where people watching can sympathise and understand this feeling of dominating emotions. The next morning, he packs his things to leave but grabs a gun from a locked drawer and checks it to see there's no bullets. He puts it in his bag and goes on his way to work as a professor. This raises questions as why would he need to take a gun to a school. He also behaves unusual to the maid which she notices when he thanks her and hugs her. This shows that his unusual behaviour could be hinting towards something bad that could happen to himself. This dark story questions the values and attitudes on the typical family and homosexuals where specific audiences can appeal to.

Art films have the ability to appeal to a niche audience because it is not required to make a lot of money, they are created by directors who create the films to convey a specific theme, idea

or attitudes they wish to present. By using specific visual techniques art films can appeal to niche audiences.

Standard Hollywood films most of the time are made for commercial use, to gain large revenue. This is done with large budgets, usually major actors and actresses, and follow a realist narrative. Art films are created for smaller audiences and stray away from the standard 'rules' such as breaking the 4th wall, reversal of roles, sequencing and continuity of the story and where the narrative should end. Auteurs are directors considered to implement their own style within each of their films. Films created by auteurs as the standard Hollywood films don't show the style of the directors.

- 10. Mother goes to kiss father, he wipes off the dirt & looks grumpy

- 13. Girl crushes butterfly

- 15. Father puts on hat and mum kisses him goodbye
