15% (30 Marks)

Question 3

(30 marks)

The two artworks pictured in **Source 3: *The young family*** (Patricia Piccinini) and **Source 4: *'Mother and Child'*** [Section] (Gustav Klimt) communicate meanings about social, cultural and historical concerns that challenge (in their time) attitudes, beliefs, values and ideologies.

Write an essay that compares and contrasts the artworks in **Sources 3 and 4**. In your essay you should:

- use appropriate visual art language (5 marks)
- comment on the similarities and differences between each artist's interpretation and communication of the theme 'mother and child/offspring'; and discuss formal organisation, meanings and artistic style (10 marks)
- compare the artists' interpretations in terms of the influence of different contextual factors prevalent at the time of production of the artworks (10 marks)
- describe what you think each artist was trying to achieve and justify your description. (5 marks)

Section Three: Investigation essay**25% (50 Marks)**

This section contains **two (2)** questions. You must answer **one (1)** question. Write your answer in the space provided.

Question 4**(50 marks)**

Using your investigation case study as the source, discuss how an artist's work you studied this year was informed by their social, cultural or historical context. You must mention at least one artwork. Use the following as guidance:

- discuss how the social, cultural or historical context shaped the meanings communicated in the artwork (20 marks)
- discuss how visual language and conventions of the time influenced the artist's practice (10 marks)
- analyse how the artist used formal, stylistic and technical techniques to communicate meaning. (20 marks)

Question 5**(50 marks)**

'Man creates Art creates Man' (Preble, 1973)

Artists' practices are influenced by the work of other artists, groups and movements.

Write an essay, using visual art language, in which you identify an artist you studied this year and refer to at least one artwork. Your essay must include information from your investigation case study as support. In your essay you should:

- review the artists that influenced the artist you studied. Show briefly how these influences can be seen in the artist's artwork (25 marks)
- provide a detailed visual analysis of artwork of the artist you studied and explain how its meaning and purpose might influence others. (25 marks)
